### New Moon watch for moon 3 - the month named Sivan during Israel's Captivity!

Yes, it's really that time again to stand our watch for the next new moon. Here's the **DATA**:

**May 13**, 2002 at even is 29 days from the last new moon sighting, the 14<sup>th</sup> will be 30 days since last.

My calculations show that there will be an apparent new moon here in the USA [Mountain Time Zone] on May 13 at about 7:00 - 7:15 PM. Illumination at our location will be about 1.7% illumination. A new moon should also have already been sighted in Jerusalem, Israel on the same date [May 13] at around 6:45 PM their time with an illumination of 1.3%. I will send confirmation via email only to those on my email-ing list.

May 13 [at even] should start month 3. This will be the <sup>3rd</sup> new moon of the year, also called **SIVAN**.

Easton's Bible Dictionary: a Persian word (Assyr, sivanu, "bricks"), used after the Captivity as the name of the third month of the Jewish year, extending from the new moon in June to the new moon in July (Esther 8:9).

The Calendar of the Saints new moon chart has a graph near the bottom showing the number and names of all the months and the expected beginning dates.

**May 13**, 1665: A statute was enacted in Rhode Island, offering freemanship with no specifically Christian requirements, thus effectively enfranchising Jews.

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Health tips from the "Old Farmer's Almanac"

Are you too skinny or just right?

HERE'S AN EASY formula to figure your Body Mass Index (BMI), now thought to be a more accurate indicator of relative body size than the old insurance charts. W is your weight in pounds and H is your height in inches.

If the result is 25 or less, you are within a healthy weight range.

If it's 19 or below, you are too skinny.

Between 25 and 27, you are as much as 8 percent over your healthy weight.

Between 27 and 30, you are at increased risk for health problems.

Above 30, you are more than 20 percent over your healthy weight. It puts you at a dramatically increased risk for serious health problems.

There are a couple of exceptions to the above. Very muscular people with a high BMI generally have

 $\frac{\text{BMI=}}{H} \frac{\text{(W x 705)} \div H}{\text{nothing to worry about, and extreme skinniness is generally a symptom of some other health problem, not the cause.}$ 

Here's another way to see if you are dangerously overweight. Measure your waistline. A waist measurement of 35 inches or more in women and 41 inches or more in men, regardless of height, suggests a serious risk of weight-related health problems.

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# Signs in the lights of the heavens?

Since these days I myself feel as if I am living larger than in times past I thought this month I might insert a basic physics lesson here which compliments the previous article regarding weights.

## **Elephant and Feather - Air Resistance**

Suppose that an elephant and a feather are dropped off a very tall building from the same height at the same time. We will assume the realistic situation that both feather and elephant encounter air resistance. Which object - the elephant or the feather - will hit the ground first? The animation at the right accurately depicts this situation. The motion of the elephant and the feather in the presence of air resistance is shown. Further, the acceleration of each object is represented by a vector arrow.

Most people are not surprised by the fact that the elephant strikes the ground before the feather. But why does the elephant fall faster? This question is the source of much confusion (as well as a variety of misconceptions). Test your understanding by making an effort to identify the following statements as being either true or false.


