Greetings all!

New moon watch 5 is here!

While many are paying hard earned vacation money to bask in the sun or swim in the sea we in the USA sometimes just take for granted the differences of our foreign visitors. So I find it is noteworthy to include in this months new moon report some enlightening information about **cultural incongruities** that may exist between us in the Americas and those from over seas.

Info like: language, how persons assimilate to their new environment, how differing nations view sports and patriotism. Perhaps you may find some of this information useful someday yourselves. I'll fully explain at the end of this letter, but first ...

The data:

On **July 11, 2002** there will be a new moon over Jerusalem Israel at sunset. At 7:00 PM [19:00 hrs] the new moon will be about 1.3 days past conjunction with a 2% illumination. This chodesh 5 begins biblical calendar month "five". Why is it month 5 and not 4? For an answer to this question please see an interesting studytitled **Calendar Studies - Abib**.


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Names of the Month

The Roman calendar month JULY

Named for Julius Caesar in 44 BC. The month originally had the Roman name of Quintilis. July has 31 days.

In the year 46 BC, the Greek <u>Sosigenes</u> convinced Julius Caesar to reform the <u>Roman calendar</u> to a more manageable form. At this time, Julius also changed the number of days in the months to achieve a 365 day year. In order to "catch up" with the <u>seasons</u>, Julius Caesar also added 90 days to the year 46 <u>BC</u> between November and February (Vardi 1991, p. 238).



"Veni, Vidi, Vici." -- "I came, I saw, I conquored" said Caesar.

A bust of the "the last Pharaoh" - Cleopatra. In the summer of 47 BC, having married her younger brother Ptolemy XIV, Cleopatra and Caesar embarked for a two month on a trip along the Nile, aboard a legendary boat. Together, they visited Dendara, where Cleoptara was being worshipped as Pharaoh, an honor beyond Caesar's reach. They became lovers, and indeed, she bore him a son, Caesarion. In 45 BC, Cleopatra and Caesarion left Alexandria for Rome, where they stayed in a palace built by Caesar in their honor.



Caesar's acts were anything but overlooked by the Romans. In 44 BC, he was killed in a conspiracy by his Senators. With his death, Rome split between supporters of Mark Antony and Octavian. Cleopatra was watching in silence, and when Mark Antony seemed to prevail, she supported him and, shortly after, they too became lovers.

I suppose that one could say the conquorer was conquored?

The Jewish calendar month AV, Ab or 'Abh

'Abh (not named in the Scriptures -KJV)

"Chodesh Av," the Month of Av, is referred to in the Bible as the "Fifth Month," counting from Nisan, the "First Month." There is a Biblical reference in BaMidbar (33:38), where we find "And Aharon the Priest went up to Hor Hahar at the command of G-d, and he died there in the fortieth year after the Jewish People had left Egypt, in the fifth month, on the first of the month."

Strong's Hebrew 2320 - chodesh kho'-desh from 2318; the new moon; by implication, a month:--month(-ly), new moon; and Abib means green ears of grain.



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Tips from the "Old Farmer's Almanac"

Gray hair!?! What gray hair! So, one of life's big questions is:

Q What causes gray hair?

Hair gets its color from the pigment melanin, the same agent that colors skin and eyes. The color is contained in the hair shaft, which is composed of long, tapering cells that have coalesced into fibrous material. Color is inherited, along with the degree and timing of graying. Gray hair is not really gray but an absence of color in the hair shaft, rendering it white or opaque. Graying usually starts (or you could say that natural pigmentation usually ceases) at the hairline and progresses toward the back of the head. The "gray," unpigmented hairs tend to be coarser than the colored hairs.

Actually lots can be learned from watching another for changes in their hair color [or lack of it] and the shine that it displays [or not] as well as their finger nails also.
