# **Greetings** friends!

Chodesh 10 is here! Seems to me that someone turned up the speed on the time machine and we're floating into another winter already!?! I wonder if all the universe has speeded up, or, maybe it's just our perceptions?

An interesting article in the magazine Scientific American [Sept. 2002 issue] titled "Real Time" by Gary Stix makes some harsh observations. The article brings to attention the advent of things like Federal Express, cell phones and computers [with which we may now multitask with many simultaneously] and how this has effected mankind as a whole. "Time has, in essence, triumphed over space", he states. The article is pre-concluded in the comment regarding the introduction of Federal Express and has only gotten faster since.



It states: At first, FedEx gave its customers an edge. But soon the whole world expected goods to arrive next morning. "When everyone adopted overnight mail, equality was restored,", Gleich writes, "and only the universally faster pace remained."

So are we reeling into another winter season, as it seems, at a faster pace than before? Perhaps you recall the words of a kinder time that harbored thoughts to "keep things simple". Here are some quotes from some famous and some infamous personalities regarding "time":

We can rest easy knowing that the Biblical calendar times are still as sure as the signs in the heavens that God originally placed there for us to use, and at the same regular pace and relevance to our seasons as they were from the beginning - it is the Earth that now wobbles after all, not the universe - heh-heh!



Onward to the data.

#### The data:

On December 5, 2002 at about 6:30 PM Jerusalem, Israel should see chodesh 10 [new moon 10]

with a 1% illumination. Around the globe that same day the new moon should appear at about 6:30 PM - Western USA time. The new moon will have about a 2% illumination by the time it becomes visible to the Western States. It will be visible just after sunset at most location throughout the USA the evening of **December 5**.

Note the date shown above in the right box of the banner. I've displayed the daytime date as opposed to the preceding days date for the new moon sighting. The first DAY is best represented by naming the daytime date which started [by biblical definition] at sunset the evening before. I'm just trying to be numerically correct as opposed to say, stating the year of "0". There really wasn't any year "0"; the year was either -1 or +1 at all times.

This chodesh 10 begins Biblical calendar month "ten". Why is it month 10 and not 9? For answers to this question and more please see a helpful bible study titled <u>Calendar Studies - Abib</u>. 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### Names of the Month

The Roman calendar month December -- the tenth month

Middle English decembre
Old French decembre
Latin december "tenth month"
Latin decem "ten" + -ber (adj. suffix)

December had 30 days, until Numa when it had 29 days, until Julius when it became 31 days long.

When you look at September, October, November and December, it seems as if the Romans couldn't count! But their year used to start in March. When Julius Caesar reorganised the calendar and made it start in January, he kept the old names, apart from one month, which he called after himself. The Romans had special names for the first day in the month (the Kalends), the seventh day (the Nones) and the fifteenth (the Ides). The Kalends belonged to Juno. The Ides belonged to Jupiter.

## A brief history of the Roman calendar months:

The original Roman year had 10 named months *Martius* "March", *Aprilis* "April", *Maius* "May", *Junius* "June", *Quintilis* "July", *Sextilis* "August", *September* "September", *October* "October", *November* "November", *December* "December", and probably two unnamed months in the dead of winter when not much happened in agriculture. The year began with *Martius* "March". Numa Pompilius, the second king of Rome circa 700 BC, added the two months *Januarius* "January" and *Februarius* "February". He also moved the beginning of the year from

Marius to Januarius and changed the number of days in several months to be odd, a lucky number. After Februarius there was occasionally an additional month of Intercalaris "intercalendar". This is the origin of the leap-year day being in February. In 46 BC, Julius Caesar reformed the Roman calendar (hence the Julian calendar) changing the number of days in many months and removing Intercalaris.



#### The Jewish calendar month

**Strong's Hebrew 2320 - chodesh** kho'-desh from 2318; the new moon; by implication, a month:--month(-ly), new moon; and Abib means green ears of grain. The *biblical calendar* month is similar to the Jewish calendar moon [month] 10:

#### Tebeth

**Est 2:16** So Esther was taken unto king Ahasuerus into his house royal in the tenth month, which *is* the month Tebeth, in the seventh year of his reign.

Note from the author: The differences of the traditional Hebrew calendar, the Biblical and the Roman calendars reveal much regarding the histories and customs of their respective authors. We today use the civil Roman calendar for our commerce and governments with almost global acceptance. However, for the Bible student it should be noted that there are several factions among each of the faiths thus the sometimes confusing and differing names of the months, seasons, beginning of years including sometimes even the Holy Days.

#### **Tebeth**

(Est 2:16), a word probably of Persian origin, denoting the cold time of the year; used by the later Jews as denoting the tenth month of the year. Assyrian tebituv, "rain."

(Gen 8:5) And the waters decreased continually until the tenth month: in the tenth *month*, on the first *day* of the month, were the tops of the mountains seen.

(Jer 52:4) And it came to pass in the ninth year of his reign, in the tenth month, in the tenth *day* of the month, *that* Nebuchadrezzar king of Babylon came, he and all his army, against Jerusalem, and pitched against it, and built forts against it round about.

(Eze 24:1) Again in the ninth year, in the tenth month, in the tenth *day* of the month, the word of the LORD came unto me, saying,

Thebirthstone for the month of December is the turquoise, the color is blue-medium, the flower is the Narcissus - meaning extreme confidence.



# From the Old Farmers Almanac

uestion: With the holidays here and pounds gained, how many calories do you have to burn to lose a pound of fat?

nswer: It takes about 3,500 calories to gain or lose a pound of fat. To give you an idea of how much energy it takes to "burn" a calorie, here are a few activities with the number of calories they burn per minute, per pound of body weight: fast ax chopping (or cross-country skiing uphill), 0.135; forking straw bales (or playing basketball), 0.063; window cleaning (or playing croquet), 0.026. So a 150-pound person forking straw bales burns 9.45 calories



per minute, which means he or she must fork bales for six hours to lose one pound. (Though not listed, the one exercise guaranteed to burn calories is pushing one's chair away from the table!)

# That Explains It!

How much sleep do we need?



The amount of sleep an individual requires varies from person to person, but most adults average eight hours of sleep.

Sleep plays a vital role in our daily regimen, as during this dormant period, it recharges and rejuvenates weary body organs and tissues, and restores the body to an alert state. A person's lifestyle is another variable in the amount of time he needs to achieve this healthy balance, and to feel well rested upon awakening.

The quality of a person's sleep also factors into the sleep equation. When we drift off to sleep, we either fall into a deep, restful sleep, or into a shallow, light sleep. One who normally requires eight hours of sleep, but sleeps shallowly, will most likely awaken feeling tired. In contrast, if the same individual sleeps fewer hours, but lapses into a state of deep sleep, he may well awaken refreshed and invigorated.

A lucky few can bypass shallow sleep altogether, and fall directly into deep sleep on an as needed basis. Alexander the Great's military prowess may have been due, in part, to his ability to take a "cat nap."

Yet one more variable factors into the amount of sleep we require: that of the brain and of the body sleeping simultaneously. Under normal circumstances, the brain's sleep center blocks off the nerves to the brain and to the body to make sleep possible. The brain has no interest in doing anything, and

could not even if it did, because the sleep center has shut down the internal organs, the arms, and the legs. Sometimes, however, the sleep center is unsuccessful in shutting down both the brain and the body at the same time. For example, in times of war, it is not unusual for soldiers suffering from sleep deprivation and from combat fatigue to continue to march, despite the fact that their brains have halted. Thankfully, such a situation is an anomaly, and does not occur with great frequency.

#### What are the harvest times in Israel?

# Answer

The agricultural year in Israel begins in the autumn (after the harvest festival of Tabernacles) with ploughing and sowing. Harvests in Israel begin in spring in the month of Adar (February/March). The following harvest times in ancient Israel are obtained from the Readers Digest book entitled Jesus and His Times, pages 100-101.

From the above, one can see that the harvest season in ancient Israel began in Adar (Feb/March) and continued by stages into autumn. The barley harvest began in March-April: the first sheaf being cut and waived in the middle of Abib, which could be any time between 21st March and the middle of April. It is the same in modern Israel. Concerning the wheat and grape harvests, the **Westminster Dictionary of the Bible** says this:

"In Palestine wheat was sown in November or December, after the rains began. The harvest was in April, May or June in Palestine varying according to the locality and the weather at the time." (page 635)

"The vintage began in the middle of September and continued into October. It was a season of festivity. In the vineyards there were singing and joyful noise, and the treaders in the press kept time by shouting as they trod the grapes. (page 629)

These details concerning harvest times in Israel are vital when determining the start of a year in the sacred calendar and the sacred Festivals in it.

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# **Scriptural Reading**

### Study Notes [a mini study]

From the JFB Commentary:

Joh 10:22-23 - DISCOURSE AT THE FEAST OF DEDICATION--FROM THE FURY OF HIS ENEMIES JESUS ESCAPES BEYOND JORDAN, WHERE MANY BELIEVE ON HIM. (John 10:22-42)

it was... the feast of the dedication--celebrated rather more than two months after the feast of tabernacles, during which intermediate period our Lord seems to have remained in the neighborhood of Jerusalem. It was instituted by Jude Maccabeus, to commemorate the purification of the temple from the profanations to which it had been subjected by Antiochus Epiphanes 165 B.C., and kept for eight days, from the twenty-fifth Chisleu (December), the day on which Judas began the first joyous celebration of it (I Maccabees 4:52, 56, 59; and JOSEPHUS, Antiquities, 7.7.7).

it was winter--implying some inclemency. Therefore,

It is noted that Christ did stay near Jerusalem and appeared at the Feast of Dedications only to be confronted by the "Jews" of that Temple to which He stated to them [KJV],

John 10:26 But ye believe not, because ye are not of my sheep, as I said unto you.

John 10:27 My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me:

To this He was confronted by those Jews,

Joh 10:31 Then the Jews took up stones again to stone him.

Jesus was there but did not remain by reason of persecution by the Jews. No doubt, Himself being of the blood of the tribe of Judah - descendant of David, He was taught about the custom of this commemoration. It is my opinion that He was there to acknowledge the commemoration of the *feast of dedication* as He was taught by His mother and father, as was the custom of the people of Judah to teach their children of these matters.

However, it is also plain that the commemoration itself was not either an holy day or a sabbath. The *feast of dedications* seems to be most similar to the custom of Thanksgiving Day created in 1621 by the Pilgrims of the then future Republic of the United States. There are other national feast days of types in other nations upon the Earth also, during which they too give thanks to their gods for blessings and other things. I do not say this to make similar the feast of dedications to the latter, but to demonstrate that people too can create a commemoration among themselves - as in the Annual Fire Fighters Memorial meeting in Colorado Springs, CO which commemorates the fallen among them and honors those who perished while in their duty of service.

So, while it is well documented that Christ was at the Temple during the time of the *feast of dedications*, it would still seem only a conjecture on my part or anyone else's to state that this was the *only* purpose that He attended the Temple during that time. The scripture does not directly indicate that Christ did in fact observe the *feast of dedication* for the full eight days as did the Maccabees in their re-dedication. No, He went off to beyond the Jordan River and abode for a time ... including during the time of the event itself [John 10:40].

But what do the scriptures really say regarding this or any of the commemorations, memorials and Holy Days mentioned in the Bible? Which days are Christians to keep and observe? Let's read on for a moment longer.

#### Introduction

By far the best way to determine the real interests of a person is to note the festivals that he/she attends. Festivals are generally happy events, when people with similar interests assemble to celebrate something.

**Leviticus 23:1-4** And the LORD spake unto Moses, saying. "Speak unto the children of Israel, and say unto them, Concerning the Feasts of the LORD, which ye shall proclaim to be holy convocations, even these are MY FEASTS! ... These are the Feasts of the LORD, even holy convocations, which ye shall proclaim in their seasons."

Note the Almighty's words "These are My Feasts" and "These are the Feasts of the LORD."

Undoubtedly Yahweh's festivals were initially given to the people of Israel, for it was His plan that through them salvation was to be proclaimed to the world. But the feasts themselves are the

#### LORD'S, not Israel's or Judah's, but Yahweh's. Remember this vital fact.

Unlike the popular festivals of Ash Wednesday, Easter, Hallowe'en and Christmas, whose observance is nowhere commanded in the Scriptures, the Feast Days of Yahweh are described in the Bible in considerable detail. They are to be proclaimed to and observed by all true believers in the LORD God of Israel. Read about these sacred memorials in Leviticus 23, Numbers 28 & 29 and Zechariah 14. There you will see overwhelming evidence of their divine origin and everlasting nature.

Stewarton Bible School's [and To the Saints of the Churches of God] aim is to draw the church's attention to these appointed feasts of the Most High; to proclaim them to all the world in accordance with this divine direction:
