Chodesh Report

Roman date: **May 3, 2003**



Greetings friends!

It's that time again! Biblical calendar month (chodesh) 2 is here!

However long the Winter season may seem to be it is a necessary part of the cycle of seasons being longer in some places than in others. Even so, it is always joyful to see the changing of a season, especially by such a colorful recovery as the month of **Zif** (May) brings. **April** showers bring **May** flowers goes the old song ...

so for this months report we will attempt to deliver to you some of the **Colors** of the season. Perhaps less colorful is the data used to understand the times, but such is as required for the proper keeping of the times.

So, onward to the data.

The data:

On **May 02, 2003** in Jerusalem Israel, at around 6:00 PM there will be a 1 day 2 hour old new moon displaying a 1% illumination. This same day in the Western hemisphere, after sunset at about 7:53 PM [daylight savings time applied], we shall see the new moon but with a 2% illumination. If we were to see only a slight 1% illumination at our time and location as distanced from Israel [our time zone] it would have been impossible for it to have been mature enough for a sighting in Israel earlier the same day. So, this 2% NM will confirm the sighting notices as reported from Israel earlier in the day.

Note the date shown above in the right box of the banner. I've displayed the daytime date as opposed to the preceding days date for the new moon sighting. The first DAY is best represented by naming the daytime date which started [by biblical definition] at sunset the evening before. I'm just trying to be numerically correct as opposed to say, stating the year of "0". There really wasn't any year "0"; the year was either -1 or +1 at all times.

This chodesh 2 begins Biblical calendar month "two". Why is it month 2 and not 1 or 3? For answers to this question and more please see a helpful bible study titled <u>Calendar Studies - Abib</u>. A brief history of the Roman calendar months:

The original Roman year had 10 named months *Martius* "March", *Aprilis* "April", *Maius* "May", *Junius* "June", *Quintilis* "July", *Sextilis* "August", *September* "September", *October* "October", *November* "November", *December* "December", and probably two unnamed months in the dead of winter when not much happened in agriculture. The year began with *Martius* "March". Numa Pompilius, the second king of Rome circa 700 BC, added the two months *Januarius* "January" and *Februarius* "February". He also moved the beginning of the year from *Marius* to *Januarius* and changed the number of days in several months to be odd, a lucky number. After *Februarius* there was occasionally an additional month of

Intercalaris "intercalendar". This is the origin of the leap-year day being in February. In 46 BC, Julius Caesar reformed the Roman calendar (hence the Julian calendar) changing the number of days in many months and removing Intercalaris.

The Jewish calendar month

Strong's Hebrew 2320 - chodesh kho'-desh from 2318; the new moon; by implication, a month:--month(-ly), new moon; and Abib means green ears of grain. The *biblical calendar* month is similar to the Jewish calendar moon [month] 10:



Note from the author: The differences of the traditional Hebrew calendar, the Biblical and the Roman calendars reveal much regarding the histories and customs of their respective authors. We today use the civil Roman calendar for our commerce and governments with almost global acceptance. However, for the Bible student it should be noted that there are several factions among each of the faiths thus the sometimes confusing and differing names of the months, seasons, beginning of years including sometimes even the Holy Days.


The birthstone for the month of May is the emerald, the color is green, the flower is the Lily of the Valley - meaning Humbleness and Humility.

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This Day in Christian History - May 3

1512 The Fifth Lateran Council opened under Pope Julius II. Its twelve sessions lasting through 1517, the council continued under Leo X, following Julius' death in 1513.

1675 A Massachusetts law was enacted requiring church doors to be locked during the worship service. (Too many people were leaving before the long sermons were completed.)

1738 English revivalist George Whitefield, 23, first arrived in America. In all, Whitefield crossed the Atlantic thirteen times, and died in Massachusetts in 1770, during his seventh visit.

1850 Sixteen year old Charles H. Spurgeon made his public profession of faith in Jesus Christ in a Primitive Methodist Chapel, in Colchester, England. Spurgeon began a preaching career the following year which did not end until his death in 1892.

1878 Death of William Whiting, 53, Anglican poet and music instructor. He is known to have written only one hymn during his life, but its popularity has endured: "Eternal Father, Strong to Save."

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From the Old Farmers Almanac

uestion: I saw the tip on cleaning silver with potato water and was wondering if you had a solution for large brass items.

nswer: A lot of brass pieces have been coated with lacquer or varnish to prevent tarnishing. To clean such pieces, apply a paste of lemon juice and cream of tartar.

Leave the mixture on the brass for five minutes, then wash in warm water and dry.

(Never scour lacquered or varnished brass.) Clean unlacquered brass in warm water with dishwashing liquid. If the brass is very dirty, boil the piece in a pan of water with one tablespoon of salt and one cup of white vinegar for several hours (this works for constant).

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That Explains It!

Who invented the zipper? Why do most Zippers have the letters YKK on them?

Whitcomb L. Judson invented the zipper and YKK is the Japanese company that makes them.

Whitcomb L. Judson was a lover of gadgets and machines and the idea for his "clasp locker" came from when a friend had a stiff back from trying to fasten his shoes. Judson's clasp locker was used mostly on mailbags, tobacco pouches and shoes. However, his design, like most first inventions needed to be fine-tuned.

A more practical version came on the scene in 1913 when a Swedish-born engineer, Gideon Sundback revised Judson's idea and made his with metal teeth instead of a hook and eye design. In 1917, Sundback patented his "separable fastener."

The name changed again when the B. F. Goodrich Co. used it in rubber boots, galoshes, and called it the "zipper" because the boots could be fastened with one hand.

The 1940s brought about research in Europe of the coil zipper design. The first design was of interlocking brass coils. However, since they could be permanently bent out of shape, making the zipper stop functioning, it was rather bad for business and wasn't too practical. The new design was improved after the discovery of stronger, more flexible synthetics. Coil zippers eventually hit the market in the early 1960s.

In 1934, Yoshida Kogyo Kabushililaisha was founded. Sixty years later they changed their name to YKK Co. The privately owned firm, headquartered in Japan, now is made up of 80 companies at 206 facilities in 52 countries. Wow! you say? but of course, the demand for zippers is great. YKK makes everything from the dyed fabric around the zipper to the brass used to make the actual device.

<mark>Did you</mark> know?

In the 1930s a sales campaign ran for children's clothing that used the new zippers. The device was

praised for promoting self-reliance in young children. "Mommy look! One zip and I'm all dressed!"

In 1937 in the Battle of the Fly it was zipper versus button. French fashion designers went wild for the new invention for men's trousers.

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Scriptural Reading - Study Notes [a mini study]

1Co 1:22 For the Jews require a sign, and the Greeks seek after wisdom:

ICo 1:23 But we preach Christ crucified, unto the Jews a stumblingblock, and unto the Greeks foolishness; A declaration of that which he said: that the preaching of the Gospel is foolish. It is foolish, he says, to those whom God has not endued with new light, that is to say, to all men being considered in themselves: for the Jews require miracles, and the Greeks arguments, which they may comprehend by their intellect and wisdom: and therefore they do not believe the Gospel, and also mock it. Nonetheless, in this foolish preaching there is the great power and wisdom of God, but such that only those who are called perceive: God showing most plainly, that even then when mad men think him most foolish, he is far wiser than they are, and that he surmounts all their might and power, when he uses most vile and abject things, as it has appeared in the fruit of the preaching of the Gospel.

1Co 1:24 But unto them which are called²⁸²², both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God, and the wisdom of God.

wisdom of God--so really exhibiting, and in the highest degree (if they would but see it), that which the Greeks sought after--wisdom (Col 2:3).

Life is not a highway strewn with flowers, Still it holds a goodly share of bliss, When the sun gives way to April showers, Here's the point you should never miss.


Though April showers may come your way,
